This Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is also known as Mothering Sunday. There are a range of views on what Mothering Sunday is about. None of them were considered important enough for it to make it into our Prayer Book though. We inherited the tradition from England, where it's a celebration of motherhood. Mostly that involves acknowledging mothers and mother-types (godmothers, grand- mothers, women who act as mothers, and anyone else who is motherly) in prayers and giving them a bunch of flowers. Ironically it's usually mothers who make up the bunches. Then there is also acknowledging the church as 'mother' in the sense of it being the source and nurturer of our faith. Connected to that is the concept of the cathedral being the 'mother church' of the diocese, so some people might go to 'headquarters' on that Sunday. In the good old days, Mothering Sunday was an occasion on which servants were allowed to have the day off and go and see their family. How sad it is that we no longer have servants. Although we could have been one ourselves!

We can't forget simnel cake either. It's a special cake made for Mothering Sunday. According to cake historians (yes they exist), the purported origins and meaning behind Simnel Cake are as varied as are the descriptions of who the guest person is on Would I lie to You?, that is, the explanations vary widely. Some cake historians (cakeorians?) favour the view that Simnel Cake

provides relief from Lenten fasting. Others suggest it's to be eaten in anticipation of the coming of Spring. That doesn't quite work for us in the Southern Hemisphere though. The last tradition worthy of mention is placing balls of marzipan on top to represent Jesus' disciples. There are only eleven, Judas being discounted, at least in a marzipanian sense. I'm not sure what the significance of eating the rest of Jesus' disciples is though.



For me, Mothering Sunday is best celebrated as honouring the church as our mother. She's not always perfect, but it's where our faith comes from. The best way to honour her is to care for her and we do that in various ways that we belong – because the church is us, not just us, but includes us. There is the formal organization, the Anglican Church and then our parish, which is a subset of it, but those are just the formal manifestations of the church as the community of faith. So while we may have problems with the formal expression of church, the church is a lot of

things, such as tradition (which evolves), doctrines, beliefs, worship, customs, but most importantly, people trying to be faithful to God, together. Of all that, the most important thing is we are in relationship together, as the 'body of Christ'. Everything else flows from that. Beliefs are not the starting point.

Comments on the readings for the Fourth Sunday in Lent

Prayer of the Day We remember that God will give us the loving acceptance we crave and need, if we allow it, and then we must give that to others.

Joshua 5:2-12 The Israelites who finally entered the Promised Land were descended from those who escaped from slavery in Egypt. Those who escaped from slavery were not granted entry to the Promised Land because they failed to trust in God in the wilderness. Spiritually speaking, they chose 'death' rather than life.

Psalm 32 Connecting with the gospel passage, the psalm speaks of the blessing of God's forgiveness, which comes through trusting God. We must relax into God, rather than needing to be coerced like a horse.

2 Corinthians 5:16-21 Paul's perspective for looking at people is whether or not they are open

to divine love which sets us free from our compulsions and obsessions.

Luke 15:11-32 We continually face a choice between accepting God's absolute love for us, or the 'world's conditional acceptance. The prodigal son chooses God's love, but only after experiencing the emptiness of the other. God is always waiting for us to come 'home' to our true selves, as sons or daughters of God.
